Grand Knight's Report

One of the biggest concerns of a Grand Knight is the financial health of the council. Past Grand Knight Bobby Ellis met that challenge, and through his perseverance managed to pull the council back from the edge of bankruptcy. It is my challenge to prevent us from backsliding!

Our analysis of our projectable income (that income we can be reasonably assured of receiving) allows us to present a proposed spending plan that covers our known, traditional expenses while providing for a few modest expenses in charitable activities that we have not addressed in the recent past. Both our projected income and the proposed spending plan are attached to this newsletter for your review. Our intention is to aim for 100% transparency in council finances.

A few words regarding the income and expenses are in order. Since our council's income is derived from both charitable fund raising and sources that are not restricted to charity, the income is categorized as either 'charity' or 'unrestricted.' A few incomes are raised for a specific purpose. Those cannot be used for any other purpose and are listed as 'Dedicated.'

A number of our expenses are clearly not charitable in nature and so can only be paid from the 'Unrestricted' funds. A number of expenses are clearly charitable in nature and can be paid from either 'Charity' or 'Unrestricted.' That leaves the other proposed expenditures. In determining which fund that each should be paid out of, the words of our First Degree..."charity does not consist of money alone, but...to sooth the t

troubled heart...wipe away the grieving tear"...was used as guidance. The 'Net Cost to Council,' which is the result of the 'Requested' expense and the 'Anticipated' income generated by the associated event, is the impact of each item on the council's balance sheet. The 'Prior Year Actual (net)' is the similar net expense for the listed items of the previous year, and is included for your comparison.

We will discuss and vote on the plan at the next business meeting on August 3rd. When we vote on the spending plan, we will be authorizing the council to write checks up to the 'Requested Amount' without further votes. Please attend if you can as we very much want your input and you support.

Chaplain's Corner



Every August 15 we celebrate the assumption of Mary into Heaven. As mother of the savior, Mary was privileged to experience what one day we all will experience—she entered into eternal life completely, both body and soul. Human beings are God's ingenious composite of two modes of creation: spiritual and material. Death, caused by sin, splits this composite by destroying the body; Jesus, by saving us from sin, saves both body and soul. Our salvation is complete when our bodies rise from death at the end of the world.

Our bodies are thus an essential part of our being. When alive, they are to be temples of the Holy Spirit and thus kept pure. When dead, they are to be treated honorably and never discarded as trash. The life with which God filled them in the womb is not gone forever but will return when the whole universe, spiritual and material, is re-created as a new heaven and a new earth. God's ever abundant life, bursting forth from His infinitely creative love, will never be defeated by death. Mary has preceded us into this new life, but if we are faithful to God's promise we will surely join her.

As I was writing this column, a video went viral. That video records a luncheon conversation in which a high official of Planned Parenthood explained how careful PP is in "crushing" an unborn baby so that valuable internal organs (especially hearts and livers) can be harvested undamaged. Those organs are then "donated" for \$50 or \$100 fees. The market value of the dead child's tissue is thus preserved. The conversation is convivial, made cheerful by wine.

The difference is too stark to need much commentary. We worship life. Even in death we have hope. God offers us resurrection into Heaven. The world prefers death. It offers us nothing but a recycle bin and a price point set for quick sale.

Our power to do good—or merely licensed our ability to wallow in pleasure? The whole world is watching.

My personal thanks to Brian for his assistance in getting me started as the new editor. We appreciate every brother's patience as we go thru this transition.

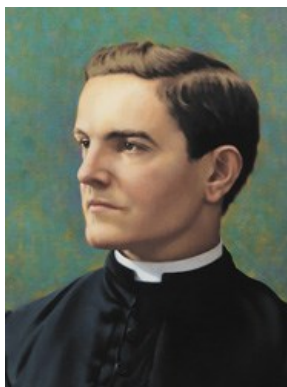
First Degree — August 17
