Due to small crowds at that bingo, the host, Gator Hall, has decided to end our bingo as of September 31st. A Corporation meeting was held following the close of our last Council meeting. Mechanical issues at the pool will seriously reduce the net pool earnings this year and negatively impact the corporation's income. The corporate treasurer presented a report which suggested that the \$6000 allotted in the Council's spending plan to pay for rent, together with the reduced pool income, may not be enough to pay the anticipated bills for the next year. It was reported that the Board of Directors' meeting will be held at 7PM on the fourth Thursday of the coming months, and that these meetings will be open to all Council members. Concerned members were encouraged to attend that meeting.

This month, I am pleased to announce Harry Griego, Stuart Stoval and Brian Velkoff as Knights of the Month. These three brothers stepped forward to manage this year's 'Hunger Is Not a Game' food drives! Congratulations!

Opportunities to Serve

"Charity does not consist of gifts of money alone..." goes a saying all Knights are very familiar with. But how does one serve our Lord and fulfill his commandment to serve the poor amidst the hustle and bustle of our busy lives? And how do we teach our children how to serve? Our Council has several on-going charitable projects that you should know about. These are specifically aimed at giving you, your Lady and your children the opportunity to serve. Take advantage of the one that best fits your interests and participate. Remember, we are a FAMILY organization so include your family when serving.

Ram House ... our Council cooks and serves lunch for the homeless and the poor at Ram House on the third Saturday of every month. There is always room for another pair of helping hands. Call Jim Sullivan (540-774-7034) for information.

Hunger Is Not a Game ... several times a year, our Community Activities Committee obtains permission to collect snacks outside of area Kroger Stores. With the assistance of Roanoke City and County Police officers, we deliver these snacks to city and county schools for the students in the after school programs. With over 600 homeless students in Roanoke City alone, there is more need than can be met. Call Brian Velkoff (540-904-8450) to participate in the next event.

Pancake Breakfasts ... every year, our Church Activities Committee schedules a pancake breakfast at each of our three parishes. Money raised at each breakfast is turned over to the pastor at that parish to use for the project of his choice. Call Pat Reidy (540-725-8206) to find out when you can help at your parish.

Keep Christ in Christmas ... selling religious Christmas cards to combat secularism in our world began in Roanoke and has since spread throughout the country. Our local pastors have said that this is one of the Knights best projects. We will be starting selling cards in October. KOVAR...stands for 'Knights of Virginia Assisting the Intellectually Disabled (Retarded)' and is the Virginia State Knights of Columbus charity corporation that provides grants to organizations serving God's

"special children" in Virginia. In addition to the 'tootsie roll' collection drives that are mostly held in the spring, for which we are most famous, we also raise money by gathering together and going out to dinner at two local restaurants that donate 20% of the food bill to KOVAR several times during the year. Rebuilding Together - Roanoke

"Rebuilding Together - Roanoke (RTR) is a community volunteer organization *[that is highly praised by local and state government]*. Its purpose is to bring together volunteers to improve the lives of low-income homeowners across the Roanoke Valley by doing the repairs needed to make their houses warm, safe, dry, accessible, energy efficient and healthy. Last year, RTR groups completed 115 projects involving over 1200 volunteer.

While it is a bit like Habitat for Humanity, it differs in several major aspects. First, RTR focuses on existing homeowners who are low income and over the age of 60, or living with disabilities, or are veterans or a surviving spouses of a veterans. Second, it matches projects that can typically be completed in one weekend with groups based upon their abilities. Third, groups as small as 8 can participate. And lastly, a group signs up for only one project, one weekend."

While they always appreciate financial support, RTR mainly needs groups of volunteer ready to perform repair projects. They are having a 'Veterans Rebuilding Day' on Sept.26th that would be a great way for you to show your patriotic support of our servicemen and women. Chaplain's Corner

The beginning of September always gives me a jolt. I can't help it. I spent 41 years in school (24 as a student, 17 as a teacher). Technically, many of those academic years started at the end of August, but I never really felt we were underway until some digital calendar assured me it was 09-01-XXXX. Even now, more than a decade after I left school for (presumably) the last time, I still have the nagging feeling that I ought to be doing something, starting something, getting ready for something. I have an inexplicable desire to get some ball-point pens and no. 2 pencils, even though I am perfectly well aware that to contemporary students these are about as obsolete as physical books and library cards.

For all of us there is or ought to be a similar periodic spiritual jolt. Maybe it comes with Advent or Christmas, Ash Wednesday or Easter. Maybe it comes with a baptism or a wedding or a funeral. Every once in a while we need God to stir us up a bit, to get us asking those big questions that we carry through life: how should I live? What's it all about? Where am I going, and why?

There's been a lot to jolt us in recent months. There's been the seemingly unstoppable rise of ISIS, which claims that God is pleased by rape, murder, and terror. Nearer home, we've discovered that chopped up baby parts can bring in as much as \$120,000 per month to a regional Planned Parenthood office. The real horrors of our world turn out to be far worse than anything Stephen King can imagine.


Yet this must not jolt us into despair, but rather into new and deeper commitment to the simple definition of our mission as Knights: practical Catholicism. It's not arrogance but truth to say that in our faith are the best answers to the mysteries of life and death. Love God. Love neighbor. Bear with one another, prop up one another, comfort the



sorrowing, and rejoice in all good things. That's what it's all about, and if we live it we are going where Jesus has led, because that is the only place to be happy.

Who Are We?



Who are we? Yes, we are the Knights of Columbus, but what does it mean when you say, I am a Knight of Columbus. It means you are a member of the largest, Catholic, Fraternal Service Organization in the world. You belong to an organization which has 1.9 million members in 14000 Councils throughout the US, Canada, Philippines, Mexico, Poland, Dominican Republic,

Puerto Rico, Panama, the Bahamas, the Virgin Islands, Cuba, Guatemala, Guam, Saipan, Lithuania, Ukraine, and South Korea. It means you share the principles of Charity, Unity, Fraternity, and Patriotism with your Brother Knights no matter where they may be. Most importantly you belong to an organization that throughout its history has always stood for religious Freedom and in defense of the Catholic Faith.

In 1914 we stood against strong anti Catholic Sentiment that saw misinformation openly printed and distributed. In the 1920's we fought all the way to the Supreme Court to overturn State laws that would have abolished Catholic Schools. We fought against discrimination not just against Catholics, but against all minorities and immigrants in direct confrontation with the Ku Klux Klan. We fought to make known the plight of the Church which was being persecuted in Mexico. We met with President Calvin Coolidge and launched a \$1,000,000 educational campaign to influence public opinion. These events are not just things in our past. We still defend our faith today. Right now, the Knights of Columbus is actively involved in providing assistance to Middle Eastern Christians in Syria and Iraq. We have provided \$3,000,000 in humanitarian aid to those Christians forced to leave their homes or be martyred. We have produced TV commercials and an expose in the New York Times Magazine to tell the world what is happening to our Christian brothers and sisters who are being driven to ex-
